There are no deferred term exams for courses offered in the Faculty of Engineering. In instances where a student has a documented reason for missing a term exam(s) and at the discretion of the instructor, the value of a missed term exam(s) can be added to the value of the final exam. A missed term exam(s) is considered assigned term work which has not been completed in determining eligibility for a deferred final exam. If the resulting final exam weight exceeds that allowed under <a href="#">§23.4(1)</a>, then any accommodation will be at the discretion of the Dean of Engineering.</li> <li>○ <b>23.4(1) Weighting of Term Work and Final Examinations:</b> In each course in which a final examination is held, a weight of not less than 30 percent and not more than 70 percent will be assigned to the final examination, except where a departure from this arrangement has been authorized by the council of the Faculty in which the department offering the course is situated. The remaining weight for the course will be assigned to term work.</li> </ul> <p>The above means that the authority to approve beyond a 70% total of mid term and final exams is at the discretion of the Dean (delegated to the Associate Dean, Student and Co-op Services).</p> </li> </ul>
<b>Calculator and formula sheet</b>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• You may use <i>approved non-programmable</i> calculators (with a gold sticker) in the midterm and final exams as long as in compliance with the Faculty of Engineering's Calculator Policy: <a href="http://www.engineering.ualberta.ca/calculator.cfm">http://www.engineering.ualberta.ca/calculator.cfm</a>.
